# Institute for Apprenticeships appoints Shadow Chair

The Institute of Apprenticeships (IfA) has appointed Antony Jenkins to the role of Shadow Chair.

Mr Jenkins is a former Chief Executive of Barclays and is the current Chairman of Business in the Community. He is also a patron of the government's employee engagement programme. He takes up his role with immediate effect, and will be joined by Nicola Bolton as Shadow Chief Operating Officer. # Over three quarters of apprenticeships delivered by ITPs

Training providers are now delivering 75% of apprenticeships, according to the Association of Employment and Learning Providers (AELP).

The figures reveal the importance of training providers in the apprenticeships ecosystem, and the extent to which outsourcing has now become accepted practice in higher education.

A closer look at the AELP analysis shows that overall, of the 499,900 apprenticeship starts in 2014-15, 76% were delivered via private training providers. And in terms of apprenticeship starts in college, 40% of those were subcontracted out to independent training providers (ITPs).

The issue of subcontracting is an especially delicate one, given the impending introduction of the apprentice levy next year. With that in mind, the AELP is lobbying to ensure that the funding allocation system recognises the contribution of ITPs and rewards the providers that directly deliver apprenticeship starts.

## Apprenticeship Reform

Skills Minister Nick Boles has admitted that a string of key apprenticeship reform announcements will be further delayed following Brexit.

The government was due to provide further funding information for apprenticeship reforms by the end of this month, with the long-awaited Sainsbury review report setting out new technical professional education (TPE) routes into work, and a subsequent skills white paper, also expected imminently.

But Mr Boles told the Association of Employment and Learning Providers (AELP) conference there would be a "little delay" following the British public's decision to leave the European Union – although they can be expected before the summer recess.

He said: "We should all continue to assume and work on the assumption that the apprenticeship levy is coming in, in the way planned as planned.

However, he added: "We had planned to publish further detailed information about the pricing of specific apprenticeship standards in the next few days. I'm sure you will understand that is now going to be a little delayed, but only a little we still expect to get that information out well before the summer break."

The government plans to slash the amount smaller firms will have to pay towards the cost of apprenticeships training after the levy launch.

Employers of all sizes currently have to pay a third of training costs with the Skills Funding Agency agrees to covering the rest, under the pilot for new apprenticeships.

That means a £1 employer cash contribution returns £2 funding – up to a cap – for the relevant standard.

The government is looking at a making a much bigger contribution after April 2017 for employers not using their apprenticeship levy pot — either because their wage bill is too small to pay into it, or because it has run out.

For every £1 invested by such employers, we understand that the SFA will pay up to £9, according to plans set to be announced later this month.

This would mean providers are to be paid as much as 90 per cent from SFA coffers — although employers not paying the levy would still have to contribute around 10 per cent in cash first.

#### English and Maths managers' network

Sue has offered to attend a future meeting to explain and give an update about what support is available from ETF.


Simon Clarke Chair of the Sub group meeting alerted members that one of the changes to the Qualification Achievement Rate (QAR) business rules for 2015-16 relates to learners on Planned Breaks in Learning. Any learners who were recorded as starting a planned break in 2014-15 who have not returned by R04 of 2016-17 will be treated as a withdrawal in the QAR. I.e. if providers have such learners this change will adversely affect success rates

Andrew Forshaw, aged 24 from Manchester secured a gold medal for the College in the Senior Carpentry & Joinery Level 3 category, staving off competition from a very talented field. Andrew, who is employed as an apprentice at Retail Outlet Design Ltd in Blackburn said, "It feels great to win a gold medal in your chosen craft and it shows that hard work pays off. I want to thank my tutors and my employer for all the help, guidance and support they have shown me over the course of my apprenticeship."

"Outstanding" Nelson and Colne College has been named number one in the country for its 16-18 apprenticeship provision across all levels.

Measured against other FE Colleges, the latest National Achievement Rate Tables place the Barrowford-based College top for its work with apprentices, aged between 16 and 18. The new figures also reveal NCC is second in the country for overall apprenticeship provision, overall classroom learning, and 16-18 classroom learning for all levels.

The latest achievements come after the College topped the Department for Education's School

and College Performance Table earlier this year for the progress students make in their A Level studies – as well as "top in the area" for vocational studies. It was also named "outstanding across the board" in the newest ALPS report, outstanding in its most recent Ofsted, and following its latest results it once again maintained a 100% pass rate for both A Levels and vocational studies.

Principal of NCC Amanda Melton said: "To be named first in the country for our 16-18 apprenticeship success is an incredible achievement, and I am, as always, so proud of Nelson and Colne College's staff and students for continually going above and beyond in their work and studies.
